Preparing for worship

Hark! The herald angels sing, "Glory to the newborn king; peace on earth, and mercy mild, God and sinners reconciled!"

I first remember singing this wonderful song as a youngster at our church Christmas pageant. (Or was it the school pageant? In those bygone days, we sang it at both.) Since then, wherever and whenever I've sung it, waves of hope and goodness have flowed through me.

Until now.

Hope, for me and no doubt others, has dimmed, overshadowed by the death and destruction of war, and the hate — even in our country — that creates such violence, divisive politics that threaten our democracy and climate degradation that could spell the end of the world God created — along with us, his anointed caretakers who seem hellbent on destroying it.

Add to this toxic mix the emergence of artificial intelligence, and it's no wonder peace on earth and mercy mild have become all but alien concepts.

And yet, through the sheer power of faith, a glimmer of hope flickers. A glimmer made brighter by the story of a mother and her son. A lowly peasant with the faith and courage to bring forth the Christ child who would one day embrace the same strong faith and courage to change the world. Mary, brave and unassuming, did not turn her back when God reached out. Rather, she leaned into the life-changing, difficult task God gave her. So did her son, who, shouldering the legacy his father bestowed on him, sacrificed his own life by speaking truth to power.

When reading the Christmas story, we sometimes overlook these bold, selfless acts of a mother and son. Unlike those who use their power to silence and subjugate, Mary and Jesus used theirs to lift up the oppressed and restore hope and faith in turbulent times. Their actions and sacrifices are beautiful examples of another of God's gifts to us, one that too often lies unopened under the Christmas tree: Her sharing of power to benefit humankind.

Sadly, the use of power to control, marginalize and silence others continues today just as it did 2,000 years ago. The fear, hate and violence it perpetuates has not abated. But God shares his power with us, so that we in turn can use it unselfishly for the good of our fellow men and women and the creation of a gentler world

This Christmas, let us open this important gift from God and do what is in our power to restore the peace and mercy mild we desperately seek for our troubled world.

Leader: And Mary sang: "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior."

People: How can it be that two millenia later and seven thousand miles from Galilee, we hear Mary's voice?

- Leader: She is still singing: "God has looked on the lowliness of his servant ... the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is God's name."
- People: That cannot be Mary's voice. A Palestinian peasant girl from Nazareth would have nothing to celebrate, nor the courage to speak. But whoever is singing cannot keep her news to herself. Listen. The voice is louder, closer now, speaking our language.
- Leader: "God has scattered the proud ... God has brought down the powerful from their thrones, and lifted up the lowly."
- People: She is singing the song of salvation. Hers is a song of justice and liberation. Mary invites us to sing with her because the poor, the persecuted are with us now as they were with her. They need to hear the new life in the lyrics, echoing through the centuries. As Mary releases the control of others, she accepts the blessing of the Divine invitation to announce the arrival of God.
- Leader: "God has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty."
- People: Every note announces that God is on the side of the oppressed, the disenfranchised, the hungry, the poor, the broken hearted. Every word announces the incarnation that God had promised Mary's ancestors in the faith, and ours.
- Leader: All you who hear Mary's voice, will you join her song?
- People: Yes! We will sing for those who have no voice. We will join the chorus, singing that Emmanuel God is with us.
- Leader: So let us proclaim together:
- People: "God has done great things for us, and holy is God's name!"

Minister of Music Call Weekend culminates in vote today Candidate Ariel Merivil leads in worship

A riel Merivil will lead in worship today in view of a call to become Wilshire's next minister of music. The Minister of Music Search Committee unanimously recommended Ariel as its final candidate to the Personnel Committee after a months-long search. Ariel is currently associate minister of music at First-Plymouth Congregational Church in Lincoln, Nebraska.

After worship there will be a short break before a special church business meeting in the Sanctuary at 12:15 p.m. The purpose of the meeting is to vote on calling Ariel.

Today's events are the culmination of a busy Call Weekend which began Thursday. Ariel participated in three open Meet and Greet sessions, met with staff and the search committee and led a special Sanctuary Choir rehearsal on Saturday.

Here's how today's vote will work:

■ Voting will be conducted by private paper ballot. Members, please make every effort to pick up your ballot in James Gallery on Dec. 17 between 9:15 a.m. and 11 a.m. Distribution will stop at 11 and will resume from the end of worship until 12:15 p.m.

■ In accordance with Wilshire bylaws, only Wilshire members present in the Sanctuary may



vote. To be eligible, you must have joined the church by Dec. 6, 10 days prior to the meeting.

■ After votes have been collected, the meeting will be recessed for votes to be counted. Members may stay in the Sanctuary during counting or leave if needed. The meeting will then be called back into session and the results announced. We will email the members later in the day to announce the result.

■ Worship Care will be extended to allow preschool families to attend the business meeting. Parents should pick up their children during the vote-counting recess.

About Ariel

S ince July 2017 Ariel has served as associate minister of music at First-Plymouth Congregational Church, a 5,000-member United Church of Christ congregation in Lincoln, Nebraska. He provides music and program leadership for at least five weekly worship services and directs seven choral and instrumental ensembles for both youth and adults.

Born in Boston and raised in Atlanta, Ariel graduated in 2007 from Southern Polytechnic State University (now Kennesaw State University) in Marietta, Georgia, with a Bachelor of Architecture degree. After working several years for an architectural firm in Atlanta, he earned a dual-concentration Master of Music in choral conducting and organ performance from Georgia State University in 2013.

Prior to his current role, Ariel served 13 years in various ministerial positions of progressive responsibility at Atlanta First United Methodist Church, including director of music, worship and administration from 2014 to 2017 and director of music and worship from 2012 to 2014.

He has conducted, instructed and accompanied high school and collegiate choirs in Nebraska and Georgia and has sung and performed as a soloist in a variety of groups, including the Lincoln Symphony Orchestra, Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, Atlanta's Chorale – New Creation, Sounding Light and Exigence, as well as at national conventions and in local concert series and music festivals.

Ariel believes "music has the power to elevate our worship and connect us to each other and the divine." This fuels his commitment to serving and ministering to all members of the congregation. The diversity of his musical background gives him the confidence to lead worship through a variety of musical styles, from classical and traditional hymns and anthems to spirituals, gospel and more. Similarly, his versatility and experience as a vocalist and choral instructor, along with his proficiency as an accompanist,



enable him to lead musicians and congregants across a broad range of musical abilities.

Performances under Ariel's direction reflect his creativity, which he also applies to stimulate participation in choral or instrumental opportunities targeted to accommodate those whose schedules may not permit weekly rehearsals or long-term commitments.

Personable, articulate and humble, he values collaboration in ministry and worship planning. Multiple colleagues and choristers commended the ingenuity and insightfulness of his organizational skills. The depth and earnestness of his Spirit-driven faith have been evident in all of his interactions with the search committee and church staff.

Perhaps fitting for someone with his education background and artistry, Ariel enjoys design, photography and gardening. He also is a cyclist and an accomplished weightlifter, having won multiple competitions in USA Powerlifting since 2016.

Tt happens every year! It's a staple L in our church; you could even say it literally holds together old and new, as great traditions do. Every year during the Youth Choir home concert after choir tour, they sing Psalm 139. It is at that moment generations of Wilshirites move to the chancel to join the youth.
