Preparing for worship

I remember my first missions trip like it was yesterday. I was a freshman at the University of Colorado and had recently come to know Christ. Eager to live into this new life, when the opportunity to spend my spring break in Jamaica serving at a children's home presented itself, I jumped on it. It combined all the things I was growing to love at the ripe age of 18; travel, culture and service. Looking back, I was naive and ignorant to things like toxic charity and the pervasiveness of Western colonialism that can and did accompany these trips.

The narrative around short-term missions for far too long has been crafted to be about others when the truth more closely resides in the fact that these experiences are more about those who go. Scholars and social researchers alike have proven this to be true. When we continue to believe and promote this fallacy, our missions trips are full of toxic ideologies like paternalism, white superiority and cultural arrogance.

So then, why does Wilshire continue to promote and lead these types of short-term missions trips? It's not lost on me that many of you will never participate for reasons I have already mentioned, but I hope it is at least beneficial for you to know the why behind our continued involvement. First, I won't lie to you; the short-term missions experiences through Wilshire will be more about you than the people you will meet. And that's OK. We need to reframe these experiences as opportunities for our own discipleship, learning and transformation.

Second, everything Wilshire does we do in partnership. Our intention is to never recreate or duplicate efforts. Every short-term experience is connected to something larger, something ongoing and to someone whose presence will remain after we leave.

Lastly, experiencing the movement of God through the lens of Cooperative Baptist Fellowship field personnel, another culture or community can propel and encourage us to be change agents in our own context. We open ourselves to seeing God in new ways, we learn new methodologies, and perhaps we even feel nudged to do something about those mutual problems that keep us from going on a trip in the first place.

There is a lot to learn in this vast and expansive world. God is working in ways we will never know unless we go. And you're right; you don't have to go far, but I do hope you'll go somewhere this year. Take a look in the *Tapestry* and you will find many meaningful ways to engage in service the next few months!

2023 giving results in surplus

Thanks to strong year-end giving, Wilshire not only met its 2023 budget but exceeded it by \$252,726, the church's largest giving surplus since 2014. Our budget for 2023 was \$3,850,000, and revenue totaled \$3,926,388. Expenses for the year were held under budget at \$3,673,662.

Senior Pastor Timothy Peoples reported on 2023 giving in an email to the church on Jan. 6. "From the bottom of my heart," he wrote, "thank you for the ways you give your heart, talents, time and treasure as we continue to build upon the kingdom of God."

Wilshire began December needing \$967,326 to make budget and wound up receiving \$1,016,690, a \$338,212 increase over giving in December 2022. In 2023, 430 family units made financial contributions, up from 369 the previous year. New members and prospects gave \$103,000.

In Wilshire's Unified Budget approach, funds received over the revenue budget are applied at the discretion of the Finance Committee. More information about plans for the 2023 surplus will be shared at the Annual Church Conference on Jan. 21, as will a proposed budget for 2024.

Signing up in advance is recommended.



Conversations, an art exhibit intended to spark dialogue on racial justice, will be on display in the South Lobby from Jan. 21 through Feb. 28. The 24 watercolor and scratchboard pieces in Vikki J. Martin's *Clotilda* series use the life cycle of the cotton plant to memorialize the enslaved people transported to the U.S. by the schooner *Clotilda*, the last known slave ship to bring captives from Africa to the American South.

From 1983 to 2017 she taught art and art history at the Episcopal School of Dallas. I've taught preschool Sunday School off and on (mostly on) for about 12 years. Now I'm with 1+ year olds. We always have room for more! In between, I'm in Epiphany Class, which was Young Adult 3 or 4 when we started at WBC in 1996. I take part in WOW — lately mahjong and Tuesday Evening Book Club. All these activities remind me of the great community I have at



WBC across generations that I wouldn't have without this church.

What has surprised you most about Wilshire?

Surprise isn't quite the right word. I'm most in awe of our willingness to be "that kind of church." We're not perfect and

we're not always good at a lot of stuff, but we're willing to work at it and (hopefully) make room for more people in the pew — or wherever they intersect with our church family. As the world and our families evolve, I've become interested in how to build community that doesn't demand 11 a.m. Sunday attendance. I know "church" requires some sort of worship as a group. Based on my WBC experiences, I know we're going to figure this out. Church is grounding for me. I know a lot of people who would benefit from the peace I get just from walking into our building. The question, of course, is how do we as a congregation extend that welcome.

What do you think God is up to in your life right now?

I don't know. I keep waiting for an email!

What's something interesting most people would not know about you?

I hitchhiked a couple times in college. It absolutely is not something I would recommend. But it shows we all did stupid stuff in our youth.
