Breathe in ... breathe out

If you've come to worship this morning under a dark cloud, you're not alone.

"Tis the season of scapegoating; a season in which we twist Christ's assertion that it's "more blessed to give ..." and anoint evil and blame on others in order to make ourselves feel better — even holier — than them.

Be it religion or race, politics or global conflict, even March Madness, we just can't help but demonize those we disagree with, those we see as different from us.

It's habit forming. Even before our morning coffee we turn to our favorite media outlet to see who's trashing whom. No wonder the U.S. is ranked the second most depressed nation globally, just behind — surprise — Ukraine.

So where can we find hope and joy in these troubled times? For me, the first is easy: worshiping at Wilshire. I continually find joy and hope in our community — in its people and the message of hope I hear through word and song.

Finding it elsewhere is trickier. We must seek it out, sometimes in unusual places.

Like prison.

Recently I started spending an afternoon every week or so at a state correctional facility, discussing life with a group of young felons. On returning home after one session, my wife, Jeanne, asked why I was always so happy when I came home from prison.

Good question. It wasn't that I was doing "good work." Rather, it was discussing everyday life with a community of incarcerated men who seemed happier and more positive than most of us on the outside. After much study and self-reflection, these men have taken full responsibility for their pre-prison life. There is no finger pointing, no scapegoating, but rather an atmosphere of hope and joy.

Intentionally or not, they have discovered something we often overlook: We are all God's children. As the Trappist monk Thomas Merton observed, just as a tree gives glory to God by being a tree, we give glory to God by being the humans God created us to be.

These men also reminded me, again to quote Merton, that "we should not be too sure of having found Christ in ourselves until we have found Him also in that part of humanity that is most remote from our own."

As God's children, perhaps it's time we all stopped scapegoating and started listening to and understanding one another.

Breathe in ... breathe out ... and be at peace.



Jones and Greg Garrett, Senior Pastor Timothy Peoples and BNG Executive Director Mark Wingfield. The webinar will start at 12:30 p.m. and run 60 to 75 minutes, with time for questions from the live audience and online participants.

Robert P. Jones is the president and founder of the nonprofit, nonpartisan Public Religion Research Institute and author of the *New York Times* bestselling *The Hidden Roots of White Supremacy and the Path to a Shared American Future* (2023), White Too Long: The Legacy of White Su-

premacy in American Christianity (2021) and The End of White Christian America (2016). He writes regularly for outlets such as The Atlantic, Time and Religion News Service.

Greg Garrett is the Carole McDaniel Hanks Professor of Literature and Culture at Baylor University. One of America's leading voices on religion and culture, his most recent book is *The Gospel According to James Baldwin: What America's Great Prophet Can Teach Us about Life, Love, and Identity.* A seminary-trained Episcopal lay preacher, he is canon theologian in residence at the American Cathedral of the Holy Trinity in Paris.




Adopt-a-Book next Sunday

Wilshire to join in gun violence advocacy project

In 2023, Wilshire advocacy partner Texas Impact launched Vidas Robadas (Stolen Lives), a project to reduce gun violence by memorializing its victims through public installations. By



displaying T-shirts that name or represent victims in Dallas County, the effort will honor the individuals and make visible the reality of gun violence in our community.

On Sunday, April 28, the Christian Advocacy Committee will host a T-shirt-making event after worship in Community Hall. Sunday School classes may choose to participate during class. Each colored shirt will show the name, age and death date of someone who died of gun violence in the last five years. Each white shirt will represent a suicide and show a crisis hotline number.

Prior to their installation at Wilshire in late May, our 200 shirts will be displayed alongside those from other churches outside the National Rifle Association convention in Dallas on May 18.

The Christian Advocacy Committee and Wilshire's deacons have wholeheartedly agreed for Wilshire to participate in Stolen Lives. The T-shirts we make will be installed along the brick wall north of the church building on Abrams Road. Many other faith communities are joining Texas Impact in this effort, which will culminate next February with a display of all shirts at the state capitol on Gun Violence Reduction Advocacy Day.


