Preparing for worship

It's Trinity Sunday, and for most of us the concept of the Trinity is confusing and even a daunting idea to comprehend. This one God broken into three aspects may not seem as monotheistic in the way our brain would like to comprehend. Eleventh-century theologian Maimonides held that God so far exceeds our capacity to have knowledge of the divine nature that we are severely limited in how we describe or comprehend God. What we think we understand about God cannot surely relate to or even define what is entirely true regarding YHWH. Therefore, our dualistic mindset ceases to understand a God of three and how it is incorporated in our worship and livelihood.

To quote Richard Rohr, "The Trinity perfectly illustrates the dynamic and interactive principle of three and was made-to-order to demolish our dualistic thinking and to open us to the mystical level. The fourth-century Cappadocian Fathers tried to communicate this notion of life as mutual participation by calling the Trinitarian flow a 'circular rotation' (perichoresis) among the three. They were saying that whatever is going on in God is a flow that's like a dance. And God is not just the dancer; God is the dance itself! Then the Incarnation becomes a movement outward and downward. Jesus comes forth from the Father and the Holy Spirit to take us back with him into this eternal embrace, from which we first came. The circle dance broadens; we are invited to join in and even have participatory knowledge of God through the Trinity. Trinity is the very nature of God, and this God is a centrifugal force, flowing outward and then centripetally drawing all things back into the dance."

It is hard to fathom God as mysterious, but in some ways it is comforting to know God invites us into the mystery. As people who demand to know all and understand everything, we are invited into a dance which asks us to lay down our dualistic thinking and see the world through the circular rotation of God. Invited to dance, invited to act, invited to share a resemblance of God in the inward and outward motifs of our lives.

This Trinity Sunday, may you tell yourself it is OK to join in the unknown mystery of how God three-in-one is working in the world and choose to dance along with it.

Wilshire's Stolen Lives display memorializes gun violence victims

More than 200 T-shirts created by Wilshire members in honor of gun violence victims have been installed along Abrams Road adjacent to the North Parking Lot. The display, called Vidas Robadas (Stolen Lives), will be up through Sunday, June 9.

Each shirt memorializes an individual lost to gun violence in Dallas County since 2018. Colored shirts represent homicide victims, and white shirts represent suicide deaths.

Senior Pastor Timothy Peoples said, "Participating in Stolen Lives is a way for our community of faith to demonstrate our commitment to helping create a safer world for our children and our community. We hope this exhibit takes the data and humanizes it. Each shirt is not just a data point, not just a shirt, but a life."

The initiative was created in partnership with Texas Impact, an Austin-based interfaith advocacy group. Wilshire's Christian Advocacy Committee coordinated our efforts.

On Saturday, May 18, a group of Wilshire members attended a rally at Dallas City Hall Plaza where our shirts were displayed along with those created by other local churches. Wilshire member Scott Spreier and Senior Pastor Emeritus George Mason spoke at the rally, which was timed to coincide with the National Rife Association's annual convention being held nearby.

A few weeks ago I traveled to Skopje, Macedonia, with two other CBF clergy. The purpose was twofold: to visit and encourage CBF field personnel Jeff and Alicia Lee and their son, Ethan, and to learn more about what a new global partnership could look like. For Wilshire, Macedonia isn't a new site — many of you visited the last CBF field personnel there, the Earls. However, the ministry has shifted over time and offers significant opportunity for us to come alongside to serve and learn.

On the trip we got a glimpse of the difficulties and joys of ministry in Macedonia. We visited the country's only food bank and visited two homes that house, educate and offer a healing environment to adults with developmental disabilities.

The Lees are doing a tremendous and faithful job of building beloved community and engaging in transformational development. One of their newest partnerships is with the only LGBTQ youth center in the country.

In recent years Wilshire has granted the Lees funds for certain projects, and now the Missions Committee and I hope to deepen this relationship and support them more fully and faithfully, perhaps taking a team as early as this fall. In Compass Class I've led Bible study, participated in community outreach and served on our Curriculum Committee. I served on Wilshire's study on faith and science and authored a piece on climate change. I share worship, fellowship in times of joy and

support in times of grief and loss. I join in prayer, study and deeds of loving kindness. I try to help my brethren in healing creation, making the Church the living embodiment of Christ in the world.

Tell us about your faith journey.

Coming from a very Baptist background of primitive faith, I was fortunate to be immersed in study of the Bible, contemplation, interpretation and disputation of religion, along with a rich music tradition and inspiration by lives of exemplary Christian teachers, pastors and missionaries (not least in my own family). With education came the need to resolve conflicts between science and much of conventional religious teaching. While pursuing a calling in science, I continually devoted energy to religious philosophy from diverse sources. I found it impossible to give up my faith in fundamental Christian truths or the truth of my rational experience. This is an unending journey, in which Wilshire is supportive.
