



Preparing for worship

This past week has been a busy one for me, and I doubt I'm the only one. Between travel, errands, work, camps, visiting family and friends, shopping for school supplies and trying to maintain some semblance of a routine, summer can be exhausting.

I find that the busier I get, the less time I spend on spiritual practices that help me feel connected to God. Prayer, journaling, meditation and reading Scripture seem easy to cut out of my schedule in order to fit more classes, jobs, trips and time with friends. But, ironically, the times we feel too busy to take time to connect with God are often the times we need God's sustaining power the most.

One reason coming to church each Sunday remains important to me is because physically showing up is one way I can reach out and allow God to dwell in me. I know that worship helps me feel connected to my community, to God and even to myself, so I make a point to block out an hour in my schedule and scurry to get all of my ducks in a row on Sunday mornings. Sometimes I have to sneak in a few minutes late. But once I'm here, I can stop. Be still. Breathe.

The pew gives me the space I need to rest — my body, my mind and my soul. There's a reason we call it the "Sanctuary" — the busyness of the world seems to pause as I sit in this space. Some days I connect deeply with the elements of worship and the people around me. Other days I just sit and let everything wash over me. But either way, I leave worship with fresh strength for today and hope for tomorrow.

We do not worship together in this space each week for the sole purpose of sending our praises and prayers up to God. We also come together to feel the movement of the Holy Spirit in the worship experience itself. Reading Scripture, singing well-loved hymns and simply being aware of the presence of God in this space are ways that God can provide us with strength, peace and comfort. Worship is not just us offering something to God; it's an opportunity for God to offer us something, too.

May we be open to receiving God's sustaining power through our worship together this morning.

After this Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Two hundred denarii would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place, so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world." When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself. When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. Youth group expanding to include grade 6

On Promotion Sunday, Aug. 18, Wilshire's youth group, currently grades 7–12, will expand to include students in grade 6.

Associate Pastor Darren DeMent explained, "Most of the school districts our students attend have sixth, seventh and eighth graders together in a middle school model, and other districts are moving in that direction. So having sixth graders in children's ministry — equivalent to elementary school — no longer matched our families' school experiences. Many CBF youth ministers I know have used a 6 to 12 model for years, so this change brings us more in line with what like-minded churches are already doing."

Youth Sunday School will have three classes grouped by school grade: 6–8; 9–10; and 11–12.

Darren said. "We've always divided the group by age to address topics in age-appropriate ways, and we'll continue to do that at camps, retreats or anytime we need to."


