



Preparing for worship

Did you know there is a saint of small things? I didn't and recently learned of St. Thérèse of Lisieux, also known as "Little Flower." Born in 1873 in France, she joined a group of contemplative Carmelite nuns and died at just 24. An unlikely saint, she had a pure childlike faith and devotion to God. She spoke to God and prayed simply and directly, with a strong dislike for lengthy prayers — such a dislike that she was known to fall asleep during community prayer. Relatable, right?

I imagine few would find the title "Saint of Small Things" appealing. We often rely on productivity to measure our worth, piling on labels and obligations that drown out God's voice. We would rather be the "Saint of All the Things." It's challenging to be open hearted when we refuse to lay our burdens down. Yet, amidst this struggle lies an invitation to practice spiritual minimalism. By releasing our self-imposed expectations, we create space for God to move within us and guide us toward St. Thérèse's "little way" of limitless acts of love. In this way, we can bloom like her beloved wildflowers — vibrant and unassuming.

We have a choice in how we live our days. In intentionally seeking moments of divine silence, we discover the profound simplicity of St. Thérèse's approach, where small gestures of kindness become vessels of grace. It's in this openness that we are transformed, allowing God's love to flow through us in ways that often go unnoticed but are deeply significant.

Our music this morning beautifully calls us to live out God's love and invites us to reflect on how we can embody that love daily. As St. Thérèse said, "To live in love is to sail forever, spreading seeds of joy and peace in hearts." May we love in the little ways — offering a smile to a stranger, lending a hand to someone in need or simply being present for those we love. These small acts may seem insignificant, but they powerfully demonstrate God's love in the world, nurturing belonging and reminding us that even the tiniest gestures can have great significance.

May our living and loving bring glory to God. Amen.





Tell us about your family.

My parents were missionaries in Congo, Africa, so I grew up there and am the eldest of four. We are all five-and-a-half years apart in age. I have one brother, Franklin, and two sisters, Susan and Brenda. I have five nephews, three nieces and two great nieces. I met my husband, Neil, in 1980. We married in 1981, giving us 43 years together. I have lived at my current address in Garland since December 1978. We have been blessed with many canine babies. We have Gidget (a Teacup Chihuahua), Beauregard (a Jack Russell), and Fiona (a Pom Italia) at the present time.

How about your work or volunteer life?

I have been a jack of all trades, but was happiest when I worked as a Qualified Mental Health Professional from 2001 to 2008 for Dallas Metrocare Services on the ACT Teams. I retired from all paying jobs in 2015. Growing up in Africa, I would carry containers of hot sweet tea to people recovering from surgery at our hospital. Later in life I volunteered as a Big Sister and with CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates) for several children. I really enjoyed my work with kids!



What are your favorite places to travel?

Congo, Africa; Texas; Austria; Jerusalem; and Athens, Greece. The Parthenon and the Acropolis in Greece are so beautiful!

What brought you to Wilshire and when?

Neil and I loved the beauti-

ful steeple and the pillars on Wilshire's building. I told Neil that I had to find out what it looked like inside. The pastor and the people were what kept us here. We joined in 1995 and have loved it ever since. What I am most thankful for at Wilshire are the loving people and the open acceptance of all folks. We don't pretend to accept all; we do it with open hearts.

Tell us about your faith journey.

I accepted Christ as my Savior at the age of 21 after a prior confession of faith at a revival meeting preached by my paternal grandfather at the age of 6.

What is something interesting most people would not know about you?

I had monkeys, parrots, owls and village weaver birds as pets in Africa.

What adjectives describe you?

Determined and grateful. I love helping people and have a lot of love to share with the folks in my life!

Clayton marks 20 years on staff

Pastoral Care Assistant Barbara Clayton celebrated her 20-year anniversary as a Wilshire staff member on Sept. 20.

Associate Pastor Heather Mustain said, "Barbara has been a staple on our staff. She is a team player, more organized than anyone I know and coordinates our pastoral care efforts with such grace and intention. I'm beyond thankful to get to work beside someone so dedicated and loyal to both the church and its people."

Barbara had already been a Wilshire member for 13 years when she joined the staff in 2004 as office manager. A couple of years later she moved to the music office, where she worked for 14 years before assuming her current role in 2020.

Barbara's work in pastoral care includes compiling and sending Wilshire's Care Notes, a list of prayer concerns emailed each weekday to over 200 church members. "If there's anybody in the hospital," Barbara says, "I call the hospital every morning to check on their room number, because sometimes they get discharged or moved."

Barbara coordinates hospital visits by ministers, creates programs for funerals and memorial services and works with the Hospitality Ministry Team to make sure ushers, greeters and Welcome Desk volunteers are in place each Sunday and for special events as needed.

She also assists Minister to Senior Adults Katie Murray with Wilshire Adventurers and other senior adult programming. Katie said, "The honest truth is I would be completely lost without Barbara. Her organizational skills are unmatched and have come to my rescue on more occasions than I can count. More importantly though, she loves and cares for this congregation with abundant grace. Doing ministry alongside Barbara is truly a blessing."

Barbara's two decades on staff at Wilshire represent only about half of her overall career working mostly in churches or ministry-related



jobs. "We're all called to be something somewhere, and I always felt called to work in the church," Barbara said. Upon learning of one church job opening early in her career, she recalled, "I got heart palpitations, I was so excited. That's just how passionate I am about it."

Before working at

Wilshire, Barbara served on staff at Lake Highlands Baptist Church, First Baptist Church in Waxahachie and Park Cities Baptist Church. She also worked at the Southern Baptist Annuity Board (now known as GuideStone) and Word, Inc., a Christian publisher.

Barbara grew up in Dallas and graduated from Lake Highlands High School. She has four adult children and four grandchildren.

Barbara sang in choir in high school and has been deeply involved in church music ministry not only as a staffer, but as a church member. At Wilshire, she sang in Sanctuary Choir for 25 years, played in Carillon Ringers for 32 years and taught preschool choir for 14 years.

A longtime Youth Choir sponsor, Barbara traveled on 19 straight summer Youth Choir tours — a streak that began in 2001, long before she joined the music staff.

"My favorite part of all my jobs was working with children and youth," Barbara said. "To see them grow into wonderful humans knowing that music played a big part. I'm still in contact with people from my youth group and youth choir. It produces lifelong friendships."
