



Preparing for worship

President Jimmy Carter was asked if God answers prayers. Carter said that God sometimes says, "Yes," sometimes says, "No," and sometimes says, "You've got to be kidding me!" President Carter was also asked specifically about his praying in the White House. Carter said he prayed 20 to 25 times a day. He prayed over all kinds of presidential decisions. Decisions that impacted individual people. Decisions that impacted the nations of the world. He specifically prayed for wisdom to do the right thing. Prayer was an integral part of his day.

We talk about prayer here at Wilshire all the time. It's a common topic. We pray "Prayers of the People" every Sunday morning. But how much do we really know about prayer? How deeply have we truly gone in our experience of prayer? Is prayer what we think it is?

One author lists 21 different forms of prayer. I suspect there are more than that. Listed are things like petitionary prayer, intercessory prayer, radical prayer, unceasing prayer, etc.

But what is prayer? It's worth reviewing the fundamentals.

We often think of prayer as conversation between us and God. Prayer has two forms. Corporate prayers are those we share as a body of believers. Personal prayers are those we craft as individuals, speaking to God and listening to God.

We craft and speak our prayers to God. But if conversation is a dialogue, a two-way interaction, how often do we stop to listen? Brother Lawrence, a 17th century French monk, described prayer as "practicing the presence of God." Stillness and silence are an integral part of prayer. Without stopping to listen, prayer can quickly devolve from dialogue to monologue. The experience of prayer can easily become an experience that is more focused on us than on God.

Rabbi Abraham Heschel said, "Prayer is dreaming in league with God." Let's dream together with God and with each other this morning. May we also find new ways of engaging with God during the week to come. May we learn to "practice the presence of God" in our daily lives.




Adventurers to Titanic exhibit

Missions and Christian Advocacy Update

As the Texas legislative session ramps up, more and more bills are making their way out of committees and onto the Senate and House floors. On behalf of the Missions and Christian Advocacy Committee, this report outlines some issues we're paying close attention to.

Gun Sense Reform: On Feb. 27, the Texas Gun Sense Coalition, a broad group of gun sense reform advocates, demonstrated on the Capitol steps in support of sensible gun reform. The T-shirts made at Wilshire memorializing victims of gun violence were displayed and made a powerful visual effect. Think about beginning your advocacy journey by joining the local chapter of Moms Demand Action or Giffords: Gun Owners for Safety.

Public Education: The governor has made vouchers a number one priority this year. On Wednesday, March 19, Wilshire will host a 6 p.m. town hall with Pastors for Texas Children to clarify what this voucher bill includes and what we can do to act. Bills are also being proposed to establish a dedicated time of prayer and require public school classrooms to display the Ten Commandments. As a church that staunchly supports public education and religious freedom, it is important for us to make our voices heard.

Reproductive Justice: While abortion remains a sensitive topic in many faith communities, the statistics around the Texas abortion bans adopted in the last legislative session show they are deadly. Maternal mortality rates in our state have skyrocketed due to the confusing and unclear language in the bans. Advocates are asking for additional clarity in language and circumstance to allow doctors to act when needed.

A Wilshire screening of *Zurawski vs. Texas*, a documentary depicting the effects of the Texas abortion bans on real women, is in the works for April. Postcards to send to representatives will be made available that evening.

Immigration: Can you imagine being afraid of going to the grocery store, sending your child

to school or seeking needed medical care? This is what it is like for many in our community as every level of our government continues to demonize the migrants among us. In April, join a small group from Wilshire that will begin to distribute groceries once a month in partnership with Vickery Meadow Youth Development Foundation. You can also attend a Know Your Rights Workshop to be an informed community advocate.

LGBTQIA+ Rights: As an affirming congregation, our support is needed more than ever to voice our opposition to anti-LGBTQIA+ legislation on every level. Equality Texas will host a March 24 rally in Austin to advocate against the hundreds of anti LGBTQIA+ bills that have been filed this session. Buses will depart from Dallas, but a reservation is required. You can also sign up for their newsletter to stay informed and find ways to use your voice. Visit equalitytexas.org.

Of course, Wilshire's committee and staff will be following it all. To get involved, contact me. You can also scan the QR code below to join one of our advocacy action groups and receive updates as needs to mobilize arise.

It's hard to remember that even in the darkest times there is hope. But friends, may our hope be found in one another and in the light of Christ. Cry, but don't do it alone — find a friend. "We were changed."

Puerto Rico team served, shared — and laughed a lot, too

A REFLECTION BY ROSS PRATER

Early on Saturday morning, Feb. 22, a group of Wilshire members boarded a flight for San Juan, Puerto Rico. It was a domestic flight as Puerto Rico is a U.S. territory. Puerto Ricans are U.S. citizens — same post office, same money — with their own language, culture, foods and ways.

Our assignment was to assist our host, First Baptist Church of Rio Piedras. Established as Puerto Rico's first Baptist church in 1899, the church has a huge building, a smallish congregation and a generous heart as it continues to help those still recovering from 2017's Hurricane Maria. This is Wilshire's third trip in response to their invitation to come and work on behalf of the beautiful and loving people of their island. Several on our team had been on one or both of the previous trips.

As with most adventures, we brought with us a range of emotions, gifts, hopes and goals. An important member of teams past, Mike Diffee, passed away suddenly weeks before the trip, and several members shared stories of his warmth and love for missions. We all were hopeful and excited about what and who was before us in the coming week.

We settled into our dorm rooms, which were air conditioned and comfortable. The meals prepared for us were tasty and hearty and served with love. Meal times included bits and pieces of sharing, humor and planning. Morning devotions by team members kept us grounded and inspired.

Sunday morning found us in our host's large sanctuary with praise music, hymns and prayers. The interim pastor, Gilda Oriandi, preached a moving sermon on love, picturing God as our pursuer and romancing us into a rich caring



relationship with the Divine. Sunday afternoon found us celebrating the natural beauty of the island at El Yunque National Forest. A beautiful visitor center, a lovely waterfall and a historic tower provided us a chance to continue learning names and stories of one another. As we finished out the day, we were gradually developing new friendships, renewing old ones and developing into a team.

After being introduced to our assignment Monday morning, we were a bit overwhelmed. It was a significant task clearly requiring several days. We jumped in. Some operated power washing equipment, and the rest grabbed brushes, rollers, scrapers, wire brushes, paint ladders and charged forth. We scraped, painted and cleaned for three days, and the work was done. It looked beautiful. The church members were happy. We were very glad to have completed the task.

In the evenings we went for ice cream, kept up with the news and family, told stories and played dominoes and other games. Our untiring host and local leader Zulma Zabala found the perfect places for us to visit and celebrate friendships and serve the Lord. One evening we watched the sunset at the beach, enjoyed the

waves, walked on the beach and shared more and more of ourselves with each other. Another evening we had refreshments at a local brewery. I had a Diet Coke. I didn't recognize the drinks the others were having.

On our last day, we painted almost the entire house of a church member, Jeannette. She was moving in soon and it was very rewarding to see her happiness. After one final morning in old San Juan and a bit of clean up and packing, we were off to the airport.

They were helped. We were changed. We served them. We served Wilshire. We served the Lord. Amen.
