Preparing for worship

Today is Pentecost Sunday, when we recall how the people of God first received the indwelling of the Holy Spirit as promised by Jesus.

My first awakening to what Pentecost was about was through the giant painting, "The Miracle at Pentecost," at what is now the Museum of Biblical Art near NorthPark. At 124 feet long by 20 feet high, the painting depicted Solomon's Portico at the Temple in Jerusalem crowded with hundreds of people, including Jesus' disciples and other familiar characters from the New Testament. In the center of the scene was Peter, and hovering above the crowd were swirling balls of luminous light representing the Holy Spirit.

I first saw this amazing work of art in the 1960s while it was still being painted by artist Torger Thompson, and I returned over the years after it was finished and lights, sounds and narration were added to bring the "miracle" of Pentecost to life in dramatic fashion. It was destroyed by fire in 2005, but the story of Pentecost still captivates me.

Imagine a moment when everyone around you is from somewhere else and they are speaking their own language and yet everyone knows what each other is saying. The closest I've come

was when we were touring the Cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris during a midday mass. In the middle of the liturgy, the priest spoke in several languages, including English, inviting everyone in the cathedral, whether there for worship or on tour, to pray the Lord's Prayer in their native tongue. And there, for a glorious moment, the cathedral echoed with the voices of a thousand people, all speaking in different languages, but all saying the same prayer: "Our Father, who art in heaven ..."

Perhaps the key to that Pentecost moment in Paris was the same as it was at that first Pentecost in Jerusalem: Everyone was speaking not just their words but the words of Christ. And perhaps that is the key to living into the spirit and miracle of Pentecost today: If we are speaking words and sharing ideas that God has given us to speak and share, then our differences can be overcome by a holy unity through the Holy Spirit that doesn't happen any other way.

As we worship today, listen for words and ideas that don't just ring true for you, but if shared by you would ring true for anyone you meet.





Giving is behind entering expensive summer months

Compared to the last four years, Wilshire's income-to-expenses deficit is larger than it has been at the same point in the year, Senior Pastor Timothy Peoples reported in an email to the church on May 22.

While the staff has managed to keep spending below budget, the deficit was \$355,430 at the end of May, as shown above.

Timothy noted in his email that the 2024 giving surplus has already been spent or spoken for. "I recognize that 2025 has been a little different financially," Timothy said. "Inflation has affected many people, and the economic market has struggled, which has determined patterns of giving in churches across the U.S. Our economy right now breeds fear of what will happen next. The stock market has been crazy with so many head-spinning ups and downs from policies and decisions. Yet, I still hold on to the hope that, as in years past, we will be surprised by the generosity of our church community in sharing their time, talents and financial gifts to ensure our ministries are funded."


Daniel Latin marks 20 years on staff

Tell us about your family.

I have none left. I'm an only child, married an only child, and we had no children. We adopted 11 cats, starting in 1964 with a cross-eyed, highly intelligent Siamese. My husband, Ed, died Christmas Eve 2007. My friends are my family, and they're spread throughout the country.

How about your work or volunteer life?

I sing in New Song Community Choir and volunteer with Friday Friends.

Any favorite hobbies?

Reading, puzzling, games, movies. Before TV, my family played board games, card games or dominoes almost every evening. My earliest memories are watching a movie in a big, dark theater with Mother. Daddy taught me to play poker.

What brought you to Wilshire and when?

George Mason's essay "Civility" in *The Advocate*. I read it during the fractious election year 2004 and couldn't believe the author was a Baptist minister. I left the Baptist church almost 50 years earlier and never returned. I listened to George's sermons on WRR and told a friend. Unbeknownst to me, she belonged to Wilshire and invited me to meet her there. I did in April 2005 and got chills when the worship service included the hymn and scripture Mother wanted at her graveside service.



When I told my friend, she said, "Oh, get over it, Mary Kay; it's just a God thing." I joined the next Sunday.

Where are you engaged at Wilshire?

I direct Whosoever Wilshire, although our generous, small-but-mighty, talky group largely directs

itself. Previously, I sang in Sanctuary Choir and occasionally taught Senior Adult Sunday School classes. Jessica Capps asked me to offer writing workshops and lead book discussions, and I enjoyed both. I served as a deacon for three years and on the lay support team for Pastoral Resident Tasha Gibson. I've been honored to participate in Faith in 3D productions.

Tell us about your faith journey.

I've never not believed in God. What I heard in sermons — as a child and a young adult, and what I heard people who called themselves Christians say about other people — turned me off churches. I was even leery of Jesus. I told George all of this when we first met. He said, "Well, stick around. You may change your mind."

What is something interesting most people would not know about you?

I dropped out of grad school and bartended in New Orleans' French Quarter.

What adjectives best describe you?
