Preparing for worship

This Sunday, we have the joy of welcoming two remarkable guests: Jeff Lee, CBF field personnel in North Macedonia, and Yusuph Emmanuel from Twelve21 in Tanzania. As I have reflected on my recent journey to visit the Lees in Macedonia, it's not just the stories of beautiful ancient monasteries or delicious Balkan meals that I tell, but the stories of transforming partnership and the deep, relational work the Lees exhibit.

Before our trip, my idea of missions was shaped by my past mission experiences that were often rooted in religious conversion and white-saviorism, so I was actually pretty hesitant going. But in Macedonia, I encountered something different. I saw faith lived out not as a numbers campaign, but as a gentle, healing presence. The Lees' ministry, and the work of partners like Yusuph, is about healing, hospitality and walking alongside others in their journeys. It's about weaving threads of community across differences, offering hope in quiet, practical ways — the Jesus way.

Barbara Brown Taylor writes in *An Altar in the World*, "The hardest spiritual work in the world is to love the neighbor as the self — to encounter another human being not as someone you can use, change, fix, help, save, enroll, convince or control, but simply as someone who can spring you from the prison of yourself, if you will allow it."

In Macedonia, I witnessed this kind of love. At Poraka, a center for adults with developmental disabilities, we played, crafted and shared meals — no agenda, just presence. At a food bank, we packed boxes for families in need. At Ratoe, a recovery center, I saw how dignity is restored through work and community. And because of the Lees' work, these ministries are not isolated but interconnected, each supporting the other, creating a community of collaboration and hope.

Our world is in dire need of Christians who feel called to be healers, not colonizers. This is why we as a church in the United States look for ways to support global missions. Not because we want to make people become more like us, but so we can learn from others and join in the work across cultures in what it means to become more like the kin-dom of God.

As we welcome Jeff and Yusuph today, I invite you to come with open hearts and curious minds.

Let's pray together for our global partners and for ourselves — that we might have the courage to listen deeply, to build bridges across difference, and to embody the healing and hope of Christ in our own neighborhoods and beyond. —Georgia McKee

For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery. ... For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters, only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become enslaved to one another. For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as your-self." If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another. Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. And those who belong to Christ have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit.

ADVOCACY UPDATE What's in the One Big Beautiful Bill?

WHILE WE WERE PLANNING OUR SUMMER activities, the "One Big Beautiful Bill Act" (OBBBA) — an approximately 1,000-page "tax" bill which virtually no person in Congress has had the time to read — had already passed the U.S. House of Representatives (by one vote) and is under consideration in the Senate. This is truly a "house on fire" moment. The president wants it on his desk to sign into law prior to the July 4 holiday.

Why does this matter to us?

There is almost no aspect of society that will be untouched by this bill: weakening of existing federal gun laws, immigration, LGBTQ matters — you name it and it will be touched, mostly in ways that will harm people. Rarely have tax packages hurt low-income Americans so directly nor has legislation that guts the safety net simultaneously handed gains to the wealthy. Below are just a few highlights.

The OBBBA establishes a national school voucher program to be administered by third-party "scholarship granting organizations" (SGOs) certified by the U.S. Treasury and IRS — this, when the majority of the population opposes vouchers. It further establishes a dollar-for-dollar tax credit, not to be confused with a tax deduction, that comes with some limits thereby landing a blow to traditional nonprofits and making fundraising even harder.

The brutal effects

Think cuts to Medicaid, the ACA (Affordable Care Act), SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) and CHIP (Children's Health Insurance Plan) don't matter much to Texans? Consider the following:

Medicaid pays the delivery cost of 48% of babies born in our state, provides medical care for 36% of Texas children and reimburses nursing facilities for the care of 61% of seniors receiving



that care. That's but a part of what it pays for.

SNAP helps provide food for 3.2 million Texans — 10.2% of our population. The OBBBA also offloads much of the SNAP cost to states for the first time, which will cost Texas approximately \$1.2 billion annually.

The ACA currently provides insurance for about 4 million Texans. An estimated 1.7 million of those will likely lose coverage, and those who keep it will likely see a sharp increase in premium costs.

CHIP provides health insurance to over 1.1 million Texas children whose parents cannot qualify for Medicaid. Together, Medicaid and CHIP provide health coverage to over 50% of Texas children.

Not only do all of these plans face financial cuts, but the OBBBA also creates a thicket of new red tape and roadblocks for current and future enrollees. Eligibility requirements will be greatly complicated, and heaven forbid that you're a refugee or DACA participant; those folks will mostly be frozen out of all the safety nets.

What you can do

Call your U.S. legislators this week.

There is still time to make a difference. If you don't want fellow Texans irreparably harmed by this bill, call, write or email your two U.S. Senators. Since the bill will go back to the House to iron out differences, contact your House representative too.

Someone to talk with.

If you are facing a life challenge and would like to have a spiritual friend to walk alongside you for a season of healing, perhaps you would benefit from a Stephen Minister.

Stephen Ministry pairs trained lay people with individuals in need of Christian companionship during times of life crisis. Wilshire has trained Stephen Ministers available.
