



Preparing for worship

Do you ever say a word so much that it starts to sound a little strange to your ears? This phenomenon, called semantic satiation, occurs because the repetition causes your brain to focus on the sound of the word and, in that process, loses the meaning of the word altogether.

Many repeated patterns within our lives, including those related to our journeys of faith, can fall into a similar trap of losing their meaning. Rituals or routines that once held significance can turn on autopilot or fall away completely.

We can all benefit from a reminder from time to time about the deeper meanings behind why we do the things we do, and today we have two such opportunities as we witness Cameron's baptism and celebrate the Lord's Supper.

In Cameron's baptism we are reminded of the promise this congregation made to the Wilson family and to every family during their family dedications, a promise to help them raise their children in a loving community so they can come to know the voice of God for themselves. We celebrate Cameron making this important

step in his faith journey today and are reminded of the meaning behind being community for one another. Through volunteering as Sunday school teachers or joining choir, serving as a greeter or coming to share a meal on a Wednesday evening we are creating the community we have promised to be for one another. Thanks be!

Our opening hymn this morning, "Worthy of Worship," evokes the majesty and awe of God. The final stanza reminds us exactly who we are here to worship: the "Almighty Father, Master and Lord, King of all kings and Redeemer, Wonderful Counselor, Comforter, Friend, Savior and Source of our life without end."

In the Lord's Supper we encounter the most remarkable part of our faith. That same God, the one we name Master, King and Almighty, thinks we are worthy too. So worthy that God chose incarnation to live among us and take on both the beauty and pain of this world. In the taking of the bread and cup may we be reminded to see each other and ourselves as God sees us, worthy of love.

New pastoral residents start

Pathways program returns to norm of four residents

WILSHIRE'S NEW PASTORAL RESIDENTS, Amanda Hines and Jordann McMahan, began their two-year terms on Friday, Aug. 1, They join Maggie Morey and Georgia McKee in the Pathways to Ministry program, which again has four residents — the historical norm for the program. No new residents were called in 2022 or 2023 as Wilshire paused to evaluate the program.

Amanda earned a Master of Divinity degree with a spiritual formation concentration from Truett Theological Seminary at Baylor University in 2022 and more recently worked for Ideal Impact, a consultancy for ministry and education. She served in ministerial or intern roles at churches in Texas and Alabama, worked for Truett managing its Online Certificate Program and was a counselor at Glorieta Camps in New Mexico. Amanda earned a bachelor's degree from Mississippi State University and is married to Chris.

Jordann completed a Master of Divinity degree in May from Truett, where she was a CBF Vestal Scholar, co-led the Women in Ministry Student Organization, worked in recruitment and served as a Baylor residence hall chaplain. She also was an intern for Baptist Women in Ministry. Jordann grew up in Virginia and was





ordained by her home church there. She earned a bachelor's degree from Old Dominion University and has been a ministry associate or intern at churches in Virginia and Texas.

Amanda and Jordann are both licensed spiritual directors through Truett.

When Wednesday night activities resume Aug. 20, the 6 p.m. Bible Study time will be devoted to getting to know the new residents. They will also be introduced at the first Lunch & Learn on Wednesday, Sept. 3. On Wednesday, Aug. 27, all four residents will lead a Vespers service in McIver Chapel at 6 p.m.







Fire drill next Sunday

Wilshire will hold a fire drill on Sunday, Aug. 10, at about 10:30 a.m. Sunday School will start at 9:45 as usual, and the drill should be done before worship starts at 11.

Risk Management Committee chair Phil McNicholas says the committee's intent is to have regular fire drills to ensure preparedness in case of a fire. "The main responsibility of the Risk Management Committee," Phil said, "is to help mitigate our church's risks, and one important risk mitigation practice is having regular fire drills."

Each Sunday School room should have a sign on the wall indicating the nearest exit. When the drill starts, look for the nearest exit sign and leave the building using the stairwells. Elevators will not be used. Each Sunday School class should designate a drill leader to advise the class on its identified evacuation route, and staff and volunteers will be located around the building to help guide you toward the proper assembly areas outside. Those with mobility issues are not required to participate.

Preschoolers and children will be supervised by their Sunday School teachers and will return to their classes once the drill is over for usual Sunday School pickup. The drill should take about 15 minutes. In case of rain, the drill will be postponed.




Next Sunday, Aug. 10
