Preparing for worship

We all know the song and have sung it at parties, restaurants and in some of the craziest places we would not want to admit. According to USA Today, "Every 5-year-old knows it. It is the most frequently sung song in the English language, according to the Guinness Book of World Records, surpassing the works of Bach, Beethoven and the Beatles, says the Songwriters Hall of Fame. It has been sung in [more than] 143 movies, translated into at least 18 languages and used in ads to sell everything from insurance to margarine."

The song's melody originated from a school teachers' greeting song titled "Good Morning to All," composed by American sisters Mildred and Patty Hill in 1893, although there have been many lawsuits and questions regarding who should be credited with the song. The first time the combination of the lyrics and melody appeared was in 1912.

Yes, I know you are at the edge of your seat to know which song it is. The answer: "Happy Birthday."

On June 14, 2026, we will be saying and singing "happy 75th birthday" to Wilshire Baptist Church! It is truly an exciting time — an opportunity to celebrate our history while also committing to our future in new and exciting ways.

Starting at today's lunch after church, we will be rolling out information regarding our celebration. While we are celebrating, we will also be rolling out new ideas that will allow us to better be Wilshire Baptist Church for the future.

In all these years Wilshire has been a guiding light in the heart of Dallas and around the nation. That doesn't mean we always got things right. But we have taken time to learn from our mistakes and even the hurts we have placed on another.

Through these years we have found ways to evolve with an ever-evolving faith. We have been a church who strives to adhere to Jesus' words "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it to me." A church of mission, justice, action, faith — and proclaimers of the Good News in a rough world. And may that always be a continued faithful path we follow.



Minister to Children Julie Girards will be recognized near the end of worship today on the occasion of her 20th anniversary on Wilshire's staff. Julie wrote this reflection for the Tapestry.

This year marks a special milestone for me — 20 years of serving as Wilshire's minister to children. Over these two decades, I've had the joy and privilege of watching countless children discover who God created them to be, grow in their faith and take their place in our community of believers — a journey made possible through the faithful service of many generous volunteers of all generations who pour their hearts into children's ministry.

One of the greatest blessings has been seeing children know that they are loved unconditionally — by God, by their families and by their church family. When a child is confident in that love, they can face life's challenges with courage and hope.

It has been equally beautiful to watch them hear God's voice in the quiet moments — whether during worship, prayer or even in a casual conversation in Sunday School. Helping them learn to listen for God's guidance is one of the most rewarding parts of this ministry.

Over the years, I've loved encouraging children to discover their uniqueness. Each child is a one-of-a-kind creation, gifted by God with talents, passions and personalities that bring color and life to our church family. A vital part of that discovery is helping them learn to celebrate diversity and see value in every living being. When they recognize the beauty in God's creation and in each other, they carry that love and respect into the world.

Central to our ministry is helping them know who Jesus is and grow in faith — learning to







love God with all their heart and to love others as Jesus taught us. Watching their understanding deepen and their compassion grow has been truly inspiring.

And finally, one of the most beautiful transformations I've seen is when children serve others and become an integral part of our community of faith. Whether helping in worship, participating in missions or encouraging a friend, they live out the truth that faith is meant to be shared.

As I celebrate these 20 years, my heart overflows with gratitude — for the children, for their families, for the volunteers and leaders who have partnered with me and for the God who has allowed me this incredible privilege. My prayer is that the seeds planted will continue to grow for generations to come.
