



Preparing for worship

In her book *The Art of Gathering*, Priya Parker observes, "There are so many good reasons for coming together that often we don't know precisely why we are doing so." So why are we gathered today?

Our weekly worship is a spiritual practice — a discipline where we set aside time to meet the divine presence of God. Many of us know the promise from Matthew 18: wherever two or three gather in God's name, they will find God's presence. This is our weekly call — we are gathered to experience God in new and transformative ways. Moments that will change us, encourage us, embolden and empower us for renewing work in our communities and the world.

Our worship is a time for rest and renewal where we receive "new mercies" for the uncertainties ahead. This week, our Scripture texts speak directly about encountering God. The psalmist declares, "I lift my eyes to the hills for help," yet recognizes that true help comes from the Lord — the one who made those hills, the seas and all that surrounds them. In Genesis, we read of Jacob wrestling with a divine visitor, from whom he demands a blessing. God an-

swered and blessed him.

When you arrived at Wilshire this morning, what hopes or expectations did you carry? Have we become so attached to ritual and tradition that we no longer expect God to do a new work in our lives? Friends, we don't have to look far to see how much around us is crumbling. And yet, God is still moving in and through you and this community of faith.

This week, we have a uniquely beautiful opportunity to worship alongside the Plymouth Choir from Plymouth Congregational Church in Lincoln, Nebraska — a community of faith much like ours, actively pursuing justice and a love-centered faith for all people. Like Wilshire, they believe God's love extends to all, and that we are charged to proclaim and embody "Good News" that is truly good for everyone.

I hope that in our worship this morning, you will find strength in the God who binds us together in community. May that strength galvanize us to press through the difficult journey of life until we reach our "home" — a world that is more loving, more just, more mercy-filled for all.

Meet today's worship leaders

Brandon A. Boyd is director of choral activities and associate professor of music at the University of Missouri. A composer, arranger and conductor, his music is sung by ensembles around the world. Brandon has served as chorus master and guest conductor with orchestras including the London Symphony, NDR Elbphilharmonie Orchestra, Nashville Symphony and St. Louis Symphony. His community-focused choral work includes organizing choirs for unhoused and incarcerated individuals.

Marques L.A. Garrett is associate professor of choral studies at the University of North Texas. An accomplished vocalist and composer, his works are performed by festival, honor, professional and university choirs. Marques is a frequent choral clinician and guest conductor, and he has presented at state, regional and national conferences on rehearsal techniques and the choral music of Black composers.

David McCoy joined Wilshire in 2018. He sings in Sanctuary Choir, attends Cord of Three Class, volunteers with Friday Friends and serves on the Funeral Ministry Team. David is retired from a career as a licensed funeral director.

Joining with our Sanctuary Choir today is **The Plymouth Choir** from First-Plymouth Church in Lincoln, Nebraska. The choir's rich history has included more than a dozen recordings, six international tours and performances with legendary composers and conductors including Robert Shaw, Randall Thompson, Rene Clausen, Rosephanye Powell, Stacey Gibbs, David Willcocks, John Rutter, Alice Parker, Anton Armstrong, Jake Runestad and Aaron Copland. Recent performances have taken the choir

from McCook, Nebraska, to Vienna, Austria; and from Carnegie Hall to the Nebraska State Penitentiary. The Plymouth Choir has been heard more than 18 million times on YouTube.

Jeremy Roberts is associate minister of music at First-Plymouth Church in Lincoln, Nebraska, where he leads the graded choir program for children and youth, directs the adult ensemble Te Deum and assists with The Plymouth Choir and worship services as organist. He previously served at First Presbyterian Church of Asheville and has been a presenter and clinician for the American Guild of Organists, Association of Lutheran Church Musicians and the Presbyterian Association of Musicians.

Tom Trenney is minister of music at First-Plymouth Church in Lincoln, Nebraska, and associate professor and director of choirs at Nebraska Wesleyan University. His choral works are published by leading music houses, and his choirs have sung at state, regional and national ACDA conventions. Tom has been a featured performer at venues including Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center and Philadelphia's Kimmel Center. Recent honors include the 2023 Raabe Prize for Choral Composition and the 2024 Nebraska Music Educator of the Year award.

Vanessa Vaughter and her husband, Woody Weilage, joined Wilshire in 2017 and are members of Epiphany Class. Vanessa sings in Sanctuary Choir and often teaches in various adult Sunday School classes. She works as a licensed clinical social worker and supervisor at The Center for Integrative Counseling and Psychology.

Texas constitutional amendments

On Nov. 4, Texans will vote on 17 amendments to the state constitution — the most at one time since 2003. The constitution can only be changed again through another legislative supermajority and statewide vote — making these decisions long-lasting.
