

Preparing for worship

Happy New Year! Well, sort of. Today marks the first day of the Christian year — the beginning of Advent. The liturgical calendar is the cycle that orients us to God. Year after year, we travel through sacred time, letting ancient stories speak something fresh for our modern faith, and we always begin with God coming down to dwell among us as a fellow human. And so here we are again at the threshold that brings us to where our journey with Christ started.

You might wonder: Why not start our year with Christmas, with Christ already here? Why begin with four weeks of watching and waiting? Barbara Brown Taylor, in her book *Learning to Walk in the Dark*, reminds us: "New life starts in the dark. Whether it is a seed in the ground, a baby in the womb, or Jesus in the tomb, it starts in the dark." Advent is the season where we pay attention to that holy darkness. We open ourselves to longing, to hope and to the prayer that light will come and guide us.

This year, we'll anchor our Advent reflections in Wendell Berry's "Sabbath Poem: 1986, I." In his words, we find ourselves standing quietly in the woods on what I imagine is a cold December morning. And if you've ever been somewhere cold and quiet like this, you might have found that the remnants of light and glimmers of life are, in fact, more profound and precious among bare branches and short days than in the easy bright fullness of summer.

This is why we start in the dark. This is why we must wait for Christ. So as the light around us dims and we anticipate new life, let us quiet our hearts and call out: "O light come down to earth." —*Georgia McKee*

One: May hope fall into the shadows of this world,



Debby Burton retiring Dec. 31

Served as senior pastor's assistant for most of 28 years

DEBBY BURTON HAS ANNOUNCED her plans to retire after 28 years on the Wilshire staff. Her last day will be Dec. 31.

For most of her time at Wilshire, Debby served as executive assistant to the senior pastor, working with George Mason for 24 years and then with Timothy Peoples. In 2024 she scaled back to part-time and became assistant for Pathways to Ministry.

"Twenty-eight years ago, I entered 'a new beginning' on staff here at Wilshire. In 2026, I will enter 'a new beginning' called retirement," Debby said. "I have been in a season of discernment for over a year. I worked through the book *The Next Right Thing* — recommended by Geri McKenzie — and sought council from mentors to help me through this huge decision. This process finally led me to have the courage to move on without regret, realizing my work here is done."

Senior Pastor Timothy Peoples said, "Debby has poured her heart, her time and her unwavering faith into this church. Through seasons of joy and challenge, Debby has been a steady presence — guiding, encouraging and lifting others up with grace. Her dedication has shaped lives, strengthened families and deepened the spiritual foundation of our community. We celebrate not just the years she served, but the lasting impact of a life lived in faithful service. We will miss her competitiveness, puzzle-making strategies and cheerful attitude."

Debby came to Wilshire in 1997 from First Baptist Church of Garland, where she was secretary to the associate pastor. At Wilshire, Debby has at various times coordinated funerals, served as church clerk, managed the Columbarium, served as staff liaison to various committees and ministry teams, coordinated



outreach and care ministries, worked closely with deacons and coordinated Sunday morning office volunteers.

She was involved in the early days of the pastoral residency program and returned to that work as the Pathways program relaunched after a brief pause during


Wilshire's pastor transition.

Pathways Director Charlie Fuller said, "I've so appreciated Debby's work and support during our short season of working together. She brings deep responsibility to her work, important institutional memory, an eye for detail and has in so many ways, both personal and professional, been a thoughtful, compassionate supporter. Debby has been an incredible asset to me, to Pathways and to Wilshire!"

Debby and her husband, David, have been married since 1982. Their two sons, Andrew (known as Doo in Wilshire Student Ministry) and Josh, grew up at Wilshire.

Debby said in her next phase she plans to "turn off the alarm clock, change my wardrobe to sweats, work jigsaw puzzles, expand my library of books and discover new opportunities that interest me."

Of her time at Wilshire, Debby said: "The faces in the chairs have changed, but the mission of building a community of faith shaped by the Spirit of Jesus Christ has remained the same. I am grateful for my time in the chair I sat in and will forever remember the experience, joy and relationships I take with me."

Columbarium prices to rise Jan. 1

Since its 2010 dedication, Wilshire's Columbarium has become the resting place for many Wilshire members and their loved ones. Over the years, we have kept prices steady, but with rising maintenance costs and the need to hire a new engraver, we are raising the price of niches and remembrance markers. Prices will change as follows: a single niche, now \$1,500, will cost \$1,750; a double niche, now \$3,000, will cost \$3,500; a remembrance marker, now \$500, will cost \$750. At Wilshire, we use a one-fund approach to giving called the Unified Budget. Your gifts support the basic mission, ministry and operations of the church. Once the Unified Budget is fulfilled, gifts overflow into visionary aspects of our mission.


End of year need: \$1,123,684

This year, you will notice two figures on our Tree of Giving. One represents what we need to cover our estimated year-end expenses,* and the other reflects what we need to fully meet our budget. Last year some of you asked why both weren't shown. We are displaying both — and I want to share why each matters.

The estimated expense number is simply what we need to break even. The budget number — though higher — is also important. More than a decade ago, Wilshire adopted a Unified Budget approach that gathers all income and expenses for our ministry into one faithful picture. It allows us to work together as one body, supporting every ministry through the annual appeal rather than relying on separate fundraising. This frees our leaders and staff to focus on worship, care, teaching, service and outreach.

Our Unified Budget also relies on year-end surplus to fund essential projects and unexpected needs. We budget about \$120,000 annually for building contingencies, but this year our needs have far exceeded that—more than triple—due to water intrusion, elevator work, electrical upgrades and other improvements that come with an aging facility. We've been able to address these only because of your generosity in past surpluses.

Looking ahead, much work



remains to maintain our facilities and sustain the ministries that shape our shared life. Your year-end giving is vital to helping us meet these needs with confidence.

During this season of giving and gratitude, I invite you to hold Wilshire in your prayers. As you reflect on the numbers before you, may you also reflect on the ministry we share — the lives we touch, the worship we offer, the disciples we nurture and the community we serve. And may you consider how you can help us remain on solid footing for today and for the future God is leading us toward.

Thank you for the ways you give, care and serve. We are grateful for you.

*Our expenses are lower than the overall Unified Budget because several areas came in under projections, including Support (about \$115,000, mainly due to lower-than-expected property insurance, security/alarm service and other costs), Personnel benefits (about \$55,000 due to retirement and group benefits being lower), Learn and Worship (about \$85,000), along with other smaller line items.
